The Scottish Rite Knights of St. Andrew adopt the tradition of being descended from these Knights and pledge themselves to service to the Scottish Rite. Over the past



Raising funds to support RiteCare is imp-

WalkRite for RiteCare began in 2009, and has grossed around \$75,000 since the beginning, all of which goes back to support speech therapy at the RiteCare Clinic.

Bjorem Speech Sound Cues are a picture cueing program to help children acquire speech sounds and literacy, especially those with apraxia or speech delays. These cards will bring an up-to-date, fun child-inspired speech and language illustrations that are diverse and speak to children.

ROYAL ORDER OF SCOTLAND

An Association of Worthy Masons and Gentlemen

The Royal Order of Scotland first came to the United States from Scotland in 1877, with Scottish Rite Grand Commander Albert Pike as the first Provincial Grand Master. Speaking of the Royal Order of Scotland, Albert Pike wrote,

"We have desired to create an association of worthy Masons and gentlemen...to assemble annually, not for dry discussions or for display, but for social intercourse and festive enjoyment...

After visiting the Omaha Valley, the Provincial Grand Lodge chose to break from tradition of holding the Degrees in a hotel ballroom and decided to utilize the Omaha Scottish Rite theater for the Degrees on July 20, 2019. They Degrees were conferred on stage, with backdrops, sound, and lighting in an impressive ceremony done entirely in rhyme and by memory by the officers.

34 Nebraska Masons from across the state applied and were approved to receive the Heredom of Kilwinning and Knight of the RosyCross of the Royal Order Degrees, along with 52 Brethren from around the nation.

Candidates required to have some degree of both Masonic "stripes," which can be York Rite or Scottish Rite honors, service as an officer in the Rites, the Shrine, or Blue Lodge, along with military experience and civic engagement. All Nebraska candidates had distinguished themselves with

service to Freemasonry as well as service to their communities in an impressive list of non-profit Boards and civic organizations.

Afterward, the Sir Knights and their ladies enjoyed fellowship during a banquet hosted at the Omaha Scottish Rite. Speaking of the Royal Order, Provincial Grand Master Sir James Winzinreid challenged members, many of whom are Past Grand Masters, Potentates, Scottish Rite or York Rite officers, as well as active men in their communities

DeFreece Letter of Thanks

our family began the RiteCare "Parent Training" course at the Munroe-Meyer Institute in October of last year. We have two children, Henry (6) and Alexander (2) who are on the Autism Spectrum. Henry has "graduated" much of his medical need for speech and occupational therapies, and is thriving in Kindergarten at Swanson Elementary.

Our family had never been able to take advantage of services provided by the Munroe-Meyer Institute due to insurance restrictions – but fortunately our 6-yearold responded well to a traditional, rigorous speech and occupational therapy course of treatment at another clinic, and received second-to-none early childhood education when he was diagnosed nearer to the age of 3.

When our younger son, Alexander, was diagnosed at 19-months-old in 2018, we knew where to "start". Alex had twenty words, but at right around 18-months-old he was down to just 2-3 words.

Little did we know that with his Autism being identifiable and diagnosed so much earlier than his older brother, a different course of treatment was needed. He was in no way responding to traditional medical speech

therapy, as his ability to attend treatment at another clinic, and received second-tonone early childhood education when he was diagnosed nearer to the age of 3.

In addition, we were

limited by our insurance company by how many visits we could make (30 total, per year), and decided to start by focusing on building his ability to attend via Occupa-

When we found out from Alex's "Birthto-3" team assigned to us by Westside School District that we may qualify for the Scottish Rite's RiteCare Parent Training course, we were thrilled. There was so much we had learned from our older son's early years, but we were now working with an ENTIRELY different child with different skills, motivators, abilities and needs - and with insanely limited health care coverage for Autism needs and medical debt already accumulated from our eldest son, we were so grateful to hear we could continue his Occupational Therapy path, AND have access to Speech Therapy.

The RiteCare program has been a game changer for our family. It has been a time for our entire family (and respite care provider) to come together and learn techniques from Beth Hughes, the speech pathologist assigned to us, that are innovative and adjustable. She helped us find a speaking device that would help grow his vocabulary and curb potential frustrations and meltdowns that are sure to come more frequently with age.

The day Beth informed our family that Alex could continue weekly ABA-based speech therapy with her on a weekly basis as he still was a ways away from true comunicative speech outside of labeling, I cried - embarrassingly hard. Beth received an unsolicited hug. Todd and I both felt a gift had been given to us and our child that we could never have imagined in a lifetime! Keeping Alexander from falling farther behind in his speech and RECEPTIVE speech development will keep our son able to grow and learn like his peers. Without this type of specialized therapy, Alex would surely fall very far behind developmentally. He is an incredibly smart boy who is loving, loved, educated and someday employable and a fantastic member of our community.

So with that, THANK YOU for accepting Alexander into the RiteCare program at Munroe-Meyer Institute. Without this program, Alex's outlook for his education, development and potential mental health may not have been the same in the future. You are truly changing lives through this program, and we are so grateful to have been a beneficiary. THANK YOU for supporting and giving hope to families like ours!
