


A Great Day to Walk for RiteCare

Scottish Rite Centennial Celebration: Grand Lodge of Nebraska Rededicates Scottish Rite Cornerstone, Followed by Fall Reunion







M.W. Dennis Rix and the officers of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska kicked off the centennial celebration of the Lincoln Scottish Rite Masonic Center with a cornerstone rededication on October 7, 2016. The event recognized the Lincoln Scottish Rite, dedicated on August 8, 1916.

After determining the cornerstone was (symbolically) laid true, corn, wine, and oil were applied to the cornerstone. Representing the produce of the land, corn, wine, and oil are used in hopes that the Lodge will prosper, "reaping the abundance of Masonic cultivation and a rich harvest of ripe character from the seeds it plants. . . The corn is poured as an emblem of nourishment; the wine as an emblem of refreshment and the oil as an emblem of joy and happiness."

Afterward, eleven Brothers received the degrees of the Scottish Rite, followed by a capping ceremony and reception in the grand ball room. Charles V. Sederstrom, Jr., 33°, capped the new 32° Princes of the Royal Secret, welcoming them to the fraternity. This Reunion class is the largest class to have joined in a long time and a fitting way to celebrate the Lincoln Scottish Rite's 100th anniversary!

Chris welcomed our RiteCare speakers, Amy Wetjen and husband Matt, who spoke about their son Mason's progress through therapy with clinician Leslie Van Winkle. They showed "Masons Journey to Speech," showcasing his progress through therapy.

Afterward, Chris Baker recognized our 2016 Friend of Scottish Rite award re-

cipient, Dr. Wayne Stuberg, Associate Director from the UNMC Munroe-Meyer Institute. Besides a long list of credentials, Dr. Stuberg serves as Associate Director, fostering a collaborative atmosphere at MMI, helping children receive the best care from all the de-

Reach for the **SUMMIT**: Nebraska Clinicians Attend National RiteCare Conference in Denver

Every two years, the Supreme Council hosts a national RiteCare conference, giving RiteCare Speech-Language Pathologists an opportunity to meet, receive continuing education, collaborate and exchange ideas.

This year, the "Reach for the Summit" RiteCare Conference was held at the Denver, Colorado DoubleTree hotel on October 13-15, 2016. About 200 clinicians and Scottish Rite Masons were in attendance, representing 28 states, along with numerous SGIGs and Sovereign Grand Commander Ronald A. Seale, 33°

Nebraska clinicians Kris Althouse (Hastings), Holly Schlautman and Carrie Kenny (Lincoln), and Leslie VanWinkle and Amy Nordness (Omaha) attended, as well as



Charles V. Sederstrom, Jr., 33°, SGIG in Nebraska, Curt Edic, 33°, and Micah Evans, 33°. Micah sat on the Models of Service Provision panel, which covered an overview of RiteCare programs, challenges and opportunities. He also sat on a panel, presenting on how Scottish Rite Orients work to build a relationship between Masons, RiteCare families and Clinicians for long-term fundraising and financial support.

With 67% of our membership 65 years or older and 11% under the age of 50, we face the challenge of a diminishing base for fundraising from Scottish Rite Masons. Our biggest opportunity, however, are that Baby Boomers are the most philanthropically-minded of all age groups, providing a prime audience to raise awareness now for charitable gift annuities and planned gifts.







The clinicians sat in several educational sessions (photo, bottom left), including telepractice, behavioral strategies, and models for early intervention for dyslexia.

After the sessions, the Denver Scottish Rite hosted a first-rate banquet with a keynote address by Sovereign Grand Commander, Ron Seale, 33°, who eloquently related the importance of the conference to one of his earliest role models, his speech teacher. Afterward, the Denver 22° Knight of the Axe Degree team impressively performed the non-esoteric parts of the degree in their beautiful 400-seat theater, which was impressively conveyed in song. Colorado SGIG Steve Munsinger, 33° led many guests on a tour of their beautiful Consistory in downtown Denver afterward.

Both Scottish Rite Masons and Clinicians came away with great ideas for better collaboration, ideas to improve therapy, and thoughts on how to work together for long-term service provision for our RiteCare children and donor development among different stakeholders.

ominic was referred to the RiteCare Clinic by his school speech therapist in June. He is a three year old, who at that time could only say 'momma' and had no other spoken words. His mother had been told by many people to just wait, and her son would someday talk. She expressed that she had no hope that they would say anything different at RiteCare, and she was so worried about her son.



She drove over 45 minutes to the RiteCare Clinic with

Dominic for their first appointment with Paul Laikko. At that point he was communicating mainly with gestures and reaching to get what he wanted. In that first session, he said more words with Paul's help than he had ever said before! Dominic continues to make progress in the sounds he can say and how he can put sounds together to make new words. With Paul's help, he is saying more words each session and tried to sing the ABC song in the car on the way to therapy today. They think Paul is fabulous!

Dominic was still not communicating independently and was not able to make sentences like typical 3 year olds. In July, RiteCare clinician Korey Stading also began working with Dominic to help expand his communication skills. In the first session, Dominic was able to use an iPad with a communication app on it to say sentences like "I want to eat chips" when "eat" might have been the only spoken word he could say. With the iPad he is now able to communicate more fully, saying "blow big bubbles." He caught on to using the pictures on the display to make sentences to communicate very quickly. His mother was so supportive and happy to have her child communicating and showing how smart he really was. Thanks to the support of the Scottish Rite Masons the RiteCare clinic was able to loan the family an iPad, so that he could use it at home and at school, as well as in therapy.

Dominic's mom wrote, "I honestly have so much hope now that one day he will be able to communicate with us! The therapists at RiteCare go out of their way to help my son. I want everyone to know how fabulous they are! Honestly I don't know where we would be without RiteCare!"
