ust out of curiosity, I looked up the number of clubs, groups, and organizations listed on the Alliance Chamber of Com-

merce website. 36 organizations are listed, representing Kiwanis, Rotary, Rifle Club, the Shrine Club, the Archery Club, and plenty more. Add to that the same number of associations and organizations in the dozen of communities the Alliance Valley represents.

What this indicates is that we naturally seek to come together in organizations of mutually shared interests. Freemasonry is no different. We value the friendships, shared values, philanthropies and the purpose.





Scottish Rite Masonry works best when we come together from across western Nebras-ka to share the brotherhood, shared values, and the community of Freemasonry.

In the book *Better Together*, authors Robert Putnam and Lewis Felstein tell stories of people who are renewing social ties by bringing the community together and connecting with others. For example, one summer arts program brings together dock workers and suburban families. Even social media, which in many way separates people, brings us together to share our own stories and events on group pages. Many of our Lodges have pages which we "like." The Grand Lodge of Nebraska Facebook page has 2,077 "likes," or roughly 20% of our statewide membership.

Freemasonry is one of the best organizations for bringing together members for a shared purpose. More important, Freemasonry transcends one community and connects diverse members across Nebraska and the nation. I will never deny that we have unique challenges in western Nebraska with Brethren coming together as Scottish Rite Masons across literally hundreds of miles. Or so John Maxell, 33° and Micah Evans, 33° feared when called to a meeting with Dr. Karoly Mirnics, Dr. Amy Nordness, and Melonie Welsh, Director of Community Engagement (pictured above at the Omaha Scottish Rite March Lodge dinner) at the Munroe-Meyer Institute.

Fortunately, Dr. Mirnics' proposal was far more friendly. In fact, he proposed that the Munroe-Meyer Institute would fund three quarters of the year's RiteCare expenses from other operational revenue sources. In return, the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska would dedicate the same quarterly payments toward fully funding a professorship in Speech-Language Pathology at UNMC.

For many years, the Scottish Rite Foundation of Omaha had been donating \$10,000 each year toward a professorship in Speech Pathology. Dr. Mirnics' proposal would allow the Nebraska Foundation to quickly build up a reserve of \$500,000 with the funds already donated, fully endowing the professorship. The new permanently-endowed professorship, to be known as the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska Professor of Speech-Language Pathology, recognizes all Nebraska Scottish Rite Masons whose donations have made this possible. Dr. Amy Nordness will be the first Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska Professor.

Dr. Mirnics was certainly right - this was an offer we could not refuse!

Skyler's Story: RiteCare Mom Writes About Son's Progress

My son Skyler is a 4 year old who was born with a cleft and has participated in the RiteCare Clinic program, since June, 2016.

Skyler has a speech problem that we have always received help through the local school district, but I was scared that during the summer his speech would go backwards without have someone else helping my husband and I with his speech.

The school had told me about the RiteCare Speech and Language Clinic at Lincoln's Barkley Memorial Center, and that they could provide additional support for my family to supplement school services for him. At the end of the last school year, Skyler's son's speech was determined to be 40% understandable to those who are not his family or classmates.

Thanks to his work with Carrie Kenny at the RiteCare Clinic, his speech was evaluated to be 70% understood by people outside of the family and his class, if not more!

The RiteCare Speech and Language Clinic has been a big part of my family life. My son looks forward to every Wednesday when we see Carrie. Over the last few weeks my husband has been taking my son while I work, and when I pick him

up after work all he talks about is what him and Carrie had worked on that day! He love showing me what they did and how they did it!

We are very appreciative of this program and what is has done for our son and family! Thank you Scottish Rite Masons for supporting speech programs and believing in Skyler!

Readingbooks is more fun when we can do an activity while reading. Kids in the clinic love to "feed" our



old lady the silly items that go with the "There Was an Old Lady..." books by Lucille Colandro.

There are many "Little Old Lady" books that focus around different holidays or seasons. This can help to target vocabulary specifics for that time. It is functional vocabulary which the child can use in daily life during that season or holiday. The pictures help to solidify the concepts for the child, and it is fun to feed the pictures to the "old lady." These books also targeting rhyming on every page, which is an early literacy skill.

So while it is cool to share this connection with prominent men, I'm just as likely to point out that the fraternity is truly a universal brotherhood of man. Sure, the Governor might be a Mason, but so is the retired electrician who is chairing a fundraising committee. The doctor entertain-

ing children as a clown at the Shrine circus is a Mason. The insurance agent is serving as officer of his Lodge, the letter carrier and the city councilor are making dinner after tonight's meeting, and the business owner is helping another Lodge confer a degree before driving 250 miles to get back to his shop tomorrow morning.

Those men, truly representing every walk of life, who are down in the trenches of Freemasonry - be it in the Lodge, in the Shrine, York Rite, Scottish Rite - are as impressive to me as any prominent actor or politicians. I point them out along with the prominent Masons as being truly indicative of the universality of Freemasonry.

I like to think of (Brother) Rudyard Kipling's poem, "The Mother Lodge," which recounts a humble Lodge in India where men came together as Brethren, regardless of their background, class, or prominence in the community.

Sure, it is great to point out that we share this fraternal bond with famous men, but we have to show our prospective members that we truly represent and welcome men of every background, faith, and profession.

By and large, that amount has held true over the years (it's a bit higher now if you want to split hairs), but you won't find more cost-effective therapy elsewhere. More important, our RiteCare therapy supports as many sessions of therapy as a child may need. Insurance may provide a few sessions of therapy and then a child is on their own. RiteCare servic-

es children, whether he needs five sessions or fifty. Our parents are genuinely grateful for these services, and many could not afford it otherwise.

In July, you will get the 101 Club appeal letter, asking for your support for \$101 to the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska. I know Masonic fundraisers are coming at you from all directions, but please consider a donation of \$101 for a child right here in Nebraska.
