

Let me tell you a tale of two cities. Or rather, a tale of two Valleys.

One major Scottish Rite Valley, steeped in 165 years of history in a major American city with more than 300 years of history, had owned their building for 110 years when the building was sold for \$3.25 million in 2015. The future of the building is uncertain, and the Valley meets at a local Lodge building in a nondescript building in the middle of a shabby, under-developed industrial park. (It took me a long time to find the building on Google Maps simply because I refused to believe that a Lodge would be located there.) I looked at their Valley website for events.

The Reunion would be done in a neighboring Valley, 80 miles away. The calendar lists only 5 business meetings from August to December and one Reunion.

#### Membership



That bears the question, why would anyone be a member? On a final effort to find out the status of the Valley, I reached out to a knowledgeable friend in the area and asked what they had done to save the building. Were their fundraisers? Was there a membership drive? Nothing, nope and nope.

Another Valley had their historic centuryold home on the market, and the fate of the Valley was uncertain. In this case, the members rallied. Today that Valley hosts wedding rentals and has served as the backdrop for several Hollywood movies. The Shakespeare Theater performs there and the Opera practices in their theater. Master Craftsmen classes meet over pizza, community performances regularly use the building, and it continues to be a vibrant part of the community.

One of the saddest things in Freemason-ry is when a Lodge folds. In every town, Masonry across America has been part of the fabric of the community, often for more than a century. When a Scottish Rite Valley folds, it represents Brethren from a dozen different Lodges. Many Brethren simply see no point in keeping their membership when the building sells and their home is lost.

I have never shied away from our challenges as a small and rural Valley - the distance to travel to events, being chief among them. This



brings me to two related themes that affect us.

First, studies show that people increasingly identify by their "tribe." Tribes are the groupings of people founded upon shared ideas and values, such as college groups which often tout themselves like independent countries. As such, we declare ourselves to be part of "Husker Nation," whether we live in New York or Scottsbluff or Lincoln. Second, we value our time over our treasure. Younger members don't see it worth the time to drive from Scottsbluff to a meeting in Alliance (and often not even a Lodge meeting in their home town), even if they are proud to say they are Masons. In an age of competing interests between work and parenthood, time is a valuable commodity.

So if we are to attract and retain people, we need to add to the quality of members lives. We need to put value into being a member of the "Scottish Rite Nation" perhaps more so than into the forms and traditions of the Lodge meeting itself. If time is precious, how do we create these opportunities to connect that welcomes members in these newly emerging trends?

If the business meeting is an outdated obstacle to joining, would members respond to a weekly or monthly dinner that welcomes families, invites an interesting speaker, and reinforces our membership and shared bonds in the Scottish Rite Nation through Masonic education? Our Valley - because of our rural nature and membership - has the unique ability to reinvent our membership to engage members in their hometown as well as at the Scottish Rite Masonic Center in Alliance.

### do you want to build a snowman?

We did, but snow melts, so we came up with another way to build one. First, we glued paper circles and triangles on plastic bags. We used Aleene's Tack-It Over & Over glue to get the paper pieces to stick to the plastic bag. Next, we filled the bags with ... shaving cream! Last, we hung the snowmen on the bulletin board.

This activity helps our students develop key language skills including:

- Following directions (first, next, last)
- Learning about shapes, colors, location, size, and numbers
- Learning about the parts of a snowman (or snowcat, depending on the builder)
- Touching different textures (sticky glue, shaving cream)

Pronouncing words like "snow," "glue," "nose," "eyes," "mouth"

We allow for "artistic license" as well. Many younger students prefer to have extra eyes and noses; preschoolers like to add accessories, including whiskers, cat ears, hats, and buttons.

Many of our students enjoyed their snow creations so much,

they took them home. Some of our "snow" creations made it to the bulletin board in our waiting room.

# LINCOLN VALLEY CELEBRATES LIFE OF PLOUGHMAN POET WITH ANNUAL BURNS NIGHT DINNER

Robert Burns, one of Scotland's most famous sons, is still celebrated for his poetry and music more than 220 years after his death at age 37. Born on January 25, 1759, Robert Burns' birthday is celebrated around the world with dinner, music, poetry, and of course, haggis, the national dish of Scotland. The Lincoln Scotlish Rite celebrated the Ploughman Poet on January 27th with the annual Burns Night dinner.

The evening was sponsored by the Lincoln Knights of St. Andrew, and Hersh (32° KCCH) and Betty Talley served as the Burns Night Chairs, welcoming nearly 100 guests for a great evening. The dinner began with cocktails in the museum and Scottish songs by *Those Two*, local musicians David Purdham and Julie Schumacher.

Guests bid on silent auction items, including Scottish ties, prints, antiques, and Husker gear, which raised several hundred dollars for the RiteCare Speech and Language Clinic at the UNL Barkley Memorial Center. The KSA also raffled a bottle of Macallan's Scotch as a fundraiser.

After a welcome by our emcee, Jerry Pigsley, 32°, Dr. Steve Lahey gave the Selkirk Grace and invocation. With bagpiper Dr. Jimmy Shelbourn, the KSA piped in the guest of honor - the haggis. Dr. Lahey read Burns immortal *Ode to a Haggis*, stabbing the "Great chieftain o' the pudding-race" with the assistance of Hersh and Betty's grandchildren Annaleis and Herschel Talley, IV.

After a fantastic dinner, guests enjoyed iced cranachan, the national dessert of Scotland made from whipped cream, flavored with whiskey, honey and topped with raspberries and oats.

As a surprise, Jerry Pigsley called Joni Bennett and Linda Wood to the podium, where he honored them with the the Scottish Rite Excellence Award.

Joni and Linda have donated literally hundreds of hours to the Valley cooking, serving, cleaning afterward, and tackling numerous projects around the building. The Valley was proud to honor Joni and Linda for all the work they do without any fanfare.

The traditional Toast to the Lassies was given by KSA Knight Master Andy Seachord, 32°. Not to be outdone by Andy, the Reply to the Laddies was given by Brooke Welsh. M.W. Richard Myers, Grand Master of Masons gave closing remarks for the evening, thanking the guests for allowing him to join the Valley as his last major event before his term as Grand Master ended the following Saturday. The evening closed with *Those Two* singing Scottish a medley of Scottish songs and leading the attendees in Auld Lang Syne.



Reuman, 32° KCCH for his numerous hours spent working on the stage, lights, and theater.



TATe first heard about the Lincoln Scottish RiteCare Clinic in November, 2015 Our son Morgan, was not making progress with his school speech therapist, and she suspected that he had Childhood Apraxia of Speech. We were very overwhelmed with this diagnosis as it's a long hard road of lots of therapy for years. After being on the wait list, he began working with Holly [Schlautman] in August, 2016. When we started, he had minimal intelligible words and could mostly only be understood by family. In the past year, he has made so much progress! He is meeting so many of his goals and is now so much more understandable! It's unbelievable to finally be able to have a conversation with my son!

We also have a daughter, Molly, who has just started working with Carrie at the Scottish RiteCare Clinic in September, 2017. She is a little delayed in speech, especially from having her brother as a speech model. It has been so nice being able to have her receive therapy at Scottish Rite's RiteCare Clinic as our health insurance does not cover therapy for delays and our school district claims she is not delayed enough to receive therapy. Without the Scottish Rite RiteCare Clinic, I don't know where we'd be.

#### House of the Temple Supports Nebraska RiteCare Services With \$5,000 Donation

The Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska received a donation of \$5,000 from the Scottish Rite Foundation, Southern Jurisdiction USA earmarked for our RiteCare Speech and Language Clinics.

This supports 50 sessions of therapy for Nebraska children at the Clinics in Kearney, Hastings, Omaha and Lincoln. Nationally, the Scottish Rite Foundation donated \$220,000 this past year to Southern Jurisdiction Orients for RiteCare, representing a significant investment from the House of the Temple in speech therapy delivered in each Valley.

On behalf of the children the RiteCare Clinics will serve in Nebraska this year, thanks to all the Scottish Rite Masons who support the House of the Temple, which in turn supports our own RiteCare Clinics!

But I don't tell you this tale of two cities to sound doom and gloom. Quite the opposite, in fact. Particularly for the Scottish Rite, we have members rallying across the state in Alliance, Hastings, Lincoln and Omaha. The calendars boast Reunions in each Valley, weekly lunches or morning donuts and coffee, membership events throughout the year, a leadership that is responsive to the demands of the membership and a membership that gets involved.

But we need to be vigilant to fill the gaps in creating the positive Scottish Rite (and Blue Lodge) experience so we don't go the way of the first Valley. Does your Valley have a need for someone to manage social media/internet and e-mail communications to members? Is someone in charge of education, providing monthly discussion about history and philosophy? Has the Lodge officers created a calendar of events for the coming year so

members can plan their attendance well in advance? All of this is circular. The website/social media manager needs events to add. That means we need to offer more than the promise of green beans and short meetings. We need members who can provide fellowship, education, and programs and events. And to fill the room for events and provide fellowship, we need a positive Reunion experience, which requires a membership committee out talking to prospective members at Lodges. Each element in a successful Valley requires that everyone is pitching in and doing their part!

The success of the Valley in the earlier example came down to one simple thing: members used their voice. They didn't rollover for the inevitable. As a Past Grand Master once said, Grand Lodge isn't the Grand Master and it isn't the building. It is the members. Same with the Scottish Rite. We are the leaders, and when we create a plan, get active, we have dynamic Valleys across the state. Nebraska sure does, and you should be proud of your Valley and your Orient.

If you are as proud as I am of how the Nebraska Scottish Rite has continued to thrive for more than a century in our Masonic homes, get involved in your Valley. Create and manage those programs and events that keep Brethren coming back and getting them involved. If we can keep doing that, we can make sure we are never going to have a "For Sale" sign in front of the Valley door and wind up as someone else's cautionary tale.



## Giving the Gift of

Even as the stock market has increased dramatically in 2018, fundraisers have been biting their nails over the 2018 tax changes. Fundraising analysts have feared that the non-profit world may raise \$20 billion less in 2018 as the standard deduction increases, reducing the ability to deduct donations.

But early indicators show that while major donors may change their habits, including "bundling" donations to take advantage of the tax changes, regular donors will still give as usual. This comes down to a fundamental reflection of their faith in the mission of the organizations.

This past year, Scottish Rite Masons have truly stepped up to support our \$632,000 annual budget for speech therapy for our RiteCare Clinics. Twenty-one Scottish Rite Masons donated \$300 as charter SGIG Circle members (with time to donate through June 30th as charter SGIG Circle members, receiving Charles Sederstrom's challenge coin as a donor) and

and over sixty Scottish Rite Masons have donated \$101, the price of one session of therapy, as 101-Club members. Members have called asking about charitable gift annuities, which provide income for life as well as tax advantages, with the principal supporting the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska after their death. Members want to know about how they can make a planned gift, remembering the Scottish Rite Foundation in their estate plans.

This speaks of greater awareness about our mission of helping children speak, as well as our teachers of the year awards, scholarships, and support for our historic Scottish Rite buildings. No one knows what will happen this year with the investment markets, but I hope you will continue to support our good works with your donations.
