Membership

Much has been written about social media, good and bad. Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and the like give us the opportunity to connect in like-minded groups. As Masons, we can “like” the Scottish Rite Facebook pages, the Shrine Facebook pages, York Rite, Grand Lodge, and dozens and dozens of other groups or organizations. We can keep up with the latest news and happenings. As a tool to reach members, young and old, social media is invaluable.

Through social media, I have met Masons across the nation, often meeting them in person at Biennial Session or the Leadership Conferences, and I keep up with them through their Facebook pages.

During the Scottish Rite Leadership Conference in Omaha in April, one of the sessions focused on the value, importance



and strategy of our social media pages, including the Scottish Rite Chirp, WSB and Valley apps (available in iTunes or Android app stores), and photos from the sessions and conference were posted on social media throughout the weekend.

But make no mistake, social media is not social capital. In fact, social media divides us as never before. We can self-divide into tribes, following news sources that fit our own political leanings or interests, ignoring

others, and dropping “friends” who disagree with us. We can post anything we want on an article, whether constructive or unconstructive or even blatantly hateful with minimal fear of consequences. This self division saps our social capital.

In the past, creating social connections was more available and evenly established in American communities. Neighborhoods mixed different socioeconomic groups - no algorithm existed to weed out those who disagree with you. Community members, encountering one another in real life at church, school or the stores, built friendships and mutual respect and greater understanding. These relationships created the social capital that bound us together, creating a sturdy social fabric. Second, strong community institutions provided the framework

Lincoln Presents 53rd Annual Distinguished Teacher of the Year

Terry Abrahams has a way with words, whether it's speaking, writing or teaching. Her colleagues call her "the Kid Whisperer."

But on Monday, May 21st, she found herself at a loss.

"An English teacher who's speechless," Abrahams said.

The longtime Lincoln Southwest High School English teacher had just been honored as the 2018 Scottish Rite Distinguished Teacher of the Year during a surprise ceremony at the school. Since 1965, the prestigious award is presented annually to a Lincoln Public Schools teacher and comes with a \$5,000 award from the Lincoln Scottish Rite Foundation.

Abrahams taught 14 years at Lincoln Northeast High School before joining Southwest 14 years ago. At Southwest, Abrahams serves as department chair and has taught everything from English 11, for students who struggle with literacy, to AP Literature. In all, she's dedicated 40 years of her life to teaching.

She grew emotional as she scanned the room on Monday. "I can't imagine having become an educator and having grown so much without all the people in this room who have nurtured me all the way. So I thank you so much for this - thank you so much."

JAY'S STORY

Jordan and Leah first became concerned about Jay's development when he was about one year old. He had been saying some words, such as mama, but began to regress in his speech. He stopped saying many of the words he had been routinely saying. Concerned, they took Jay for an evaluation through the schools, and learned he was on the Autism spectrum. Four months later, they pursued a medical diagnosis, where they met clinician Leslie Van Winkle. Following Jay's medical diagnosis, Jay and his parents began a parent training program with Leslie through UNMC Munroe-Meyer Institute's RiteCare Clinic. Leslie provided Jordan and Leah with materials, practice, and feedback in order to continue his therapy at home. Leslie also worked closely with the Autism Care for Toddlers Clinic to monitor where he was on the wait-list, including coordinating his care once he reached the top of the list. Jay continues to see Miss Leslie at the Autism Care for Toddlers Clinic through the Munroe-Meyer Institute where he receives approximately 18 hours of applied behavior analytic services each week.

Leah raves about Jay's work with Leslie. "Leslie has done wonders for him," Leah



said. He is saying "mama" again, using gestures and understanding gestures, too. Jay is also learning to use a communication device to tell others what he wants and needs while his speech develops. Leslie continues to work with the family to ensure that Jay has a way to communicate across every environment. Leslie says this about Jay and his family: "Leah and Jordan are incredible parents who will do anything and everything possible for their son. Working with Jay and seeing him grow and learn has been an absolute joy! Thank you to the Scottish Rite Masons for making all of this possible!"

we used to interact, not Facebook or Twitter. Community organizations still exist and continue to help members, but there are so many, each focusing on a single agenda (the NRA or the Humane Society, as two examples) - yet fewer Americans participate in them. Our online communities - particularly news sources - have become echo chambers which foster our own pre-existing political or social values.

This bespeaks the value and importance of the face-to-face nature of Freemasonry. Through the democratic nature of Freemasonry, where men of all backgrounds meet on the level, we empathize with the Brother or the widow facing hard times and lend a helping hand. Brethren of strong political opinions put aside their profound differences to break bread, share a laugh, and work together.



We are having fun with all the online tools available to Masons. But are we building the true social capital our fraternity is designed to create this way?

Bridging social capital, that key element crossing all lines of geography, race, politics, religion socioeconomic status, cannot be found through an algorithm on Facebook. Social media, while in many ways a wonderful tool, also is designed to drive us

to those with similar views and away from those espousing uncomfortable or unpopular beliefs. These connections require real, human contact. There is no substitute. There is no replacement for personal interaction and empathizing with others unlike you.

It is easy to be an online Mason, to share a funny meme or join in a conversation on a social media page. But if you really want to build the true capital our fraternity promotes, you have to show up at a meeting and sit with Brethren. Masonry is, above all else, a face-to-face fraternity.

I urge all Scottish Rite Masons to attend a meeting and meet their Brethren. You'll enjoy yourself, I promise. And you'll be making our fraternity all the stronger for the experience!

Giving the Gift of VOICE

Last July, the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska, which has the ultimate responsibility for the RiteCare Speech and Language Clinics in Nebraska kicked off the annual 101-Club appeal. We had a stellar year, raising \$14,262 to date for RiteCare services. 22 Brethren stepped up as Charter members of the SGIG's circle, donating or pledging \$300 or more for the year, or at least three sessions of therapy. 55 Brethren donated as full 101-Club members, donating \$101 or more, which represents at least one session of therapy for a child in Nebraska.

In all, Nebraska Scottish Rite Masons supported 5,915 sessions of therapy for 456 children (this represents individual children, rather than the total number of children since many children receive more than one session of therapy). Scottish Rite Masons donated more than \$658,000 to provide these services at RiteCare Clinics at the University of Nebraska at Kearney, the Hastings Masonic Center, the UNL Barkley Memorial Center and the UNMC Munroe-Meyer Institute.

That is truly impressive, and every Scottish Rite Mason should be proud that we are able to contribute these sums. The families are profoundly grateful for speech therapy, and I hope you read their stories in each



edition of the *Scottish Rite Journal* and share them with family, friends and prospective Brethren. We have given an estimated \$25 million to RiteCare over the last 40 years - no small testament to the faith we have in these services and the value they provide to tomorrow's leaders.

This July, the 2018-2019 101-Club letter will go to members, and I would again ask you to consider supporting our RiteCare services. SGIG Circle members will be recognized all year in the *Scottish Rite Journal*, with an asterisk for the Charter Members.

New SGIG Circle members receive a beautiful challenge coin, authorized by Charles V. Sederstrom, Jr., 33°, SGIG in Nebraska, and 101-Club donors of \$101 or more receive the 101-Club lapel pin. Any donation makes a huge impact on our ability to provide speech therapy to children, which we continue to offer without any regard to a family's ability to pay.
