In a team building exercise through work, I came across the quote from neuroscience researcher John Cacioppo, who makes the argument that "we don't derive strength from our rugged individualism, but rather from our collective ability to plan, communicate, and work together." He writes, "to grow to adulthood as a social species. . . is not to become autonomous and solitary, it's to become the one on whom others can depend."



As men, we often face the cultural pressure to go it alone. We tackle a project ourselves or shoulder the burdens of family or work ourselves, without seeking help or even a sympathetic ear. But the very essence of Freemasonry turns the idea of rugged individualism on its head.

Degree work, meetings, and ritual absolutely rely on Brethren. Brethren. Plural. A Lodge requires seven Masons to open. There is literally no point in Freemasonry where a man can be a Mason by himself without others.

It is universally acknowledged that the 30th Degree is one of the most sublime Degrees in the Scottish Rite. That is born out by an exchange when the Master of Ceremonies presents the Candidates, saying "We have assembled here to consider their petition. Their only claim to admission among us is that they are men..." The Preceptor says "The word man express no claim of right to enter here, and those who come are to obey and not to govern." The Master of Ceremonies replies, "I meant a man in the Roman sense of the word vir, a true man upon whom you can depend and whose intellect has attained manhood..."

Central Nebraska Valley Celebrates Annual Remembrance and Renewal

Forms and Traditions of the Scottish Rite best sums up the annual ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal with the words of Jesus at the Last Supper, who said "A new commandment I give unto you. That ye love one another." (John 13:4). This expresses the most sublime truth: all men are brothers, sharing one origin and one common obligation. Forms and Traditions notes, "This observance strengthens the ties of brotherly love, past and present. We meet together to break the bread of fraternity, to reconcile ourselves with those we may have offended, and to drink the wine of refreshment."

The ceremony, led by Randy Jones, 33° and Monte Malouf, 33°, Wise Master for the Chapter of Rose Croix, began by extinguishing the lights. As darkness encroaches, we remember that evil strengthens, chaos increases, despair looms, and hope seems to diminish. George White, 33° then read the names of 36 Brethren who passed in 2019 and 2020 (since the Ceremony was not able to be held last year, due to the pandemic) while Phil Odom, 33° lit candles in their memory. Afterward, the ceremonial team relit the candles, shattering the gloom. Hope returns, with courage, compassion, and joy. As Brethren, we feel renewed confidence and joy.

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The Masonic Legacy by Dr. Mike Kleppinger Hastings, Nebraska

The year was 1918 and World War I was raging. Like 2.4 million other young American men, my grandfather, William Earl Tillma of David City, Nebraska, found himself drafted into the U.S. Army. He was sent to Ft. Dodge, Iowa for basic training, and then shipped to France aboard the Tras-os-Montes. He was stationed near Bordeaux. He was an Artillery man with Battery D, 338 Field Artillery, 88th Division, training to fire the five-inch mobile howitzer canon.



W. Earl Tillma was raised on May 23, 1918 at Fidelity Lodge No. 51 and was a member in good standing for more than 41 years.

On October 28, 1918, Earl wrote to his fiancé in David City,

"My dearest Louisa ... This is the first letter that I have written to you for more than two



weeks now. ... I have a good reason though for not writing and that is because the Spanish Influenza got a hold on me and I landed in the Hospital about two weeks ago."

It wasn't until Earl returned home after the war that the

family learned the details. Earl's health during that time declined so badly that he was placed in the "dead tent" - - so many soldiers fell ill that the ones not expected to survive were triaged to a separate unit and given minimal care. A passing doctor happened to notice Earl's Masonic ring. Being a Mason himself, the doctor stopped to examine Earl and said to a nurse, "I think this one can recover. Move him to the recovery tent."

Earl had a slow recovery. It wasn't until late November, after Armistice Day, that he rejoined his battery. At one point he wrote Louisa, "The Spanish influenza got me where I weighed about as much as you."



A SNAPSHOT OF RITECHARE PROGRESS

RiteCare Clinician Holly Schlautman sent us this series of e-mails from a RiteCare parent, sharing a snapshot of what kids and their parents are learning to help improve their speech through the Lincoln RiteCare Clinic.

In her email, a RiteCare Mom wrote that her son, Finn (age 4), had been trying to say "Bruce Wayne" (the Batman character) but it sounded really funny to her. It sounded more like "osh wing". She said "it gets really confusing for him and me because he says 'sandwich' in exactly the same way." She wondered if we could start "working on the building blocks" of the word or just let him be for now on these bigger words.

I emailed her back, agreeing how frustrating it must be that a food and a toy sounded identical, and that I loved how she was thinking of new word targets for therapy! I wrote, "Yes we can do a simplification strategy with each of these words, meaning we'd model an easier version of the word at first. Some of sounds could be simplified and then we could help Finn grow into more complicated word structures as he accomplishes each stage."

For example, we simplified "Bruce Wayne" into the following sounds:

Woo Weh Boo Weh Boo Wayne Boot Wayne Boos Wayne Bruce Wayne

and "Sandwich" into the following sounds:

I offered to have her test it out before the next session and that we could try it together the following session. She responded with "Okay awesome! That makes a lot of sense, I ha(d) been kind of mulling this over in my head and then I thought I should just bring it up to (you), haha! We will work on it and see where we get with it. It definitely gets confusing when there's no context as to which word he's saying. And especially when he is interacting with people that aren't with him on a really regular basis. Like his grandparents, I find myself having to "translate" so to speak what's he's saying quite often.

When I asked if I could share her experience with the Scottish Rite Masons, she quickly agreed and emailed back, "I really love RiteCare and it's been an invaluable component to Finn's speech/language development. The school districts programs are great, too, but I feel like they are sometimes just stretched thin as far as the child's time with a speech therapist and the relationships aren't built as strongly with parent/SLP because not much communication happens face to face. I am really grateful for you and having a program like RiteCare accessible for Finn!"

Finn is showing growth week after week and I am so proud of the progress he's made and the efforts both he and his mother put forth to help him make even more gains!




Venerable Master Dan Deffenbaugh, 32° KCCH rekindles the ceremonial candles

After the war, Earl returned home to David City and married my grand-mother, Louisa Hahn. They had two children. Earl co-owned a men's clothing store and served as Mayor of David City from 1950 to 1954.

This story of my grandfather's experience in the Great War was passed down through oral history. He knew that he owed his life to having worn that Masonic ring. The ring is important to me, as I would not be here today without it.

There's a lot packed into this exchange.

Being a man by gender is not enough to be a Scottish Rite Mason. Being at the age of adulthood is not enough to be a Scottish Rite Mason. The Master of Ceremonies references the Hebrew word משטִר (meshtar), which in this context is meant to mean a commanding quality and manner. And yet, even this is not enough to be a Scottish Rite Mason.

The Master of Ceremonies very specifically uses the Latin word *vir*, meaning *man* more in the sense of *manliness* than male. But *vir* is a very sneaky word. It shows up as the root of the word *vir*tuous, tying the art of manliness to high moral standards. Having set the stage with the Latin root word *vir*, the key phrase in the 30° is "a true man, upon whom you can depend."



Rugged individualism is completely antithetical to the concept of Freemasonry

A person can't be dependable by himself. By definition, it requires collective effort. A man can't have a commanding manner in a vacuum. It, too, requires more than one person.

So to return to the original point, the Scottish Rite Mason is expected to have a commanding quality and manner. But as a social person, he must develop the virtues of care for and connections with the people he leads (or follows, as the case may be). Care and connections with our Brethren are indispensable requirements for Masons, regardless of whether we are leaders or not. A commitment to care and connection is the bare minimum threshold for a virtuous Mason and a Scottish Rite Mason.

This changes the social contract of Freemasonry from one of just having a lapel pin and a dues card to requiring virtuous behavior, which includes the development of connections with our Masonic Brethren. If we are to not just build our membership, but build ourselves as better Masons, creating these social connections and learning to rely on Brethren (or be relied upon) is an absolutely essential part of the lessons of Freemasonry.
