n the 19th century, one way businesses demonstrated their viability and strength was through their company's letterhead. Stationery featured their factory belching smoke, their offices in New York, London, and Boston, a description of their wares, and the firm's prominent directors and officers.

Advertising, too, went for the bigger-isbetter approach, and right through the 1950s, you couldn't pick up a magazine without a flowing description of a product and its benefits, with every font, photo, picture, or drawing crammed into the advertisement for good measure.

But in the 1960s, all this changed. Branding consultants did away with this old image and went for the less-is-more approach. The International Amalgamated Widget Company, Ltd. might have been

renamed WidgeCo and their logo reflected that simplicity with a bold Helvetica font. Lufthansa, J.C. Penny, and so many others adopted bold but graphically simple logos. Advertisements became simple: just a picture of a product and a slogan: "Coke. It's the real thing." Remember "Volkswagen: Think Small" ads, which began in 1959?

Masonry followed suit. We demonstrated the strength of our fraternity with mighty buildings, extraordinary theaters, lavish pageantry, parades with literally thousands of Shriners marching down the street in elaborate costumes. Knights Templar awarded extraordinary silver platters for drill competition, and cost was no object!

By the latter decades of the 20th century, Masons also scaled back, though more out of necessity than conscious choice. We sold



off many of our buildings, consolidated Lodges, and thousands joining our Lodges trickled down to hundreds. Simplicity became the watchword. Even the longform Q&A section of the degrees became the short-form members learn today.

Scottish Rite Masons Celebrate Feast of Tishri

wenty-five Scottish Rite Masons and L guests came together on November 3 to celebrate the bonds of brotherhood at the Feast of Tishri. As Dr. Dan Deffenbaugh, 32° explained, the Feast of Tishri has its origins in the Jewish feast of Sukkot, held during the Jewish month of Tishri. Sukkot was one of the mandatory feasts commanded by the Lord commemorating the temporary shelters used by the Jews during their wandering in the desert. The feast has its origins as a fall harvest festival, representing renewed fellowship with God. For Masons, the Feast of Tishri is a symbolic time to renew our fellowship with ourselves and our fraternity.

The Feast of Tishri also commemorates the dedication of Solomon's Temple, an



edifice of particular interest to us as Freemasons. For Masons, WE are the Temple; we are the stones and our mystic bond the cement.

After introductions by our Master of Ceremonies, Bill Nottage-Tacey, 32° KCCH and a welcome by Bob Scott, 32° KCCH, Dan offered a Hebrew blessing. Writing on the Wall Omaha Valley Dedicates Painted Mural



On October 24, the Valley of Omaha dedicated a mural painted on the west side of the Scottish Rite, along the parking garage wall.

The mural was the fruit of several months of discussion about how to continue to beautify the Scottish Rite and integrate the historic building into the fabric of downtown Omaha. Past projects outside the building include "the Ashlars," a stylistic representation of the rough and perfect ashlars by local artist Charles V. Fisher, dedicated in May, 2013. Additionally, the Scottish Rite built a new sign in material matching the limestone exterior with a digital LED display (middle photo), promoting upcoming events and activities.

The task of creating the picturesque scene



went to Virginia-based Bulgarian-native Ivo Koytchev. This is his second collaboration with Scottish Rite. The partnership was engineered by interior designer and artist Sandra Lassley from Fe-Fi-Faux Studios. In 2014, Lassley brought Koytchev to Omaha to help her restore the Grand Cross Conference Room, including redecorating its ornate, gold-leaf crown molding and ceiling, dedicated at the Fall 2014 Reunion.

Since coming to the United States in 1989, Koytchev has received numerous commissions in the Washington, D.C. for his murals, including a three-story-tall portrait of Elizabeth Taylor that towers over a beer garden in the northwest part of the district! The Scottish Rite painting of an idyllic garden scene includes two Ionic columns representing the Scottish Rite's forty-foot



exterior columns, and a few nods to our Masonic degree work, which the viewer is left to discover for himself. Ivo also recommended, which the Board approved, a commission to paint clouds on the ceiling of the second floor hallway, adding a beautiful element to the floor. Ivo says the paint is guaranteed to last for at least 100 years.

The Scottish Rite finished the project with landscaping, benches and lighting to the lawn. The project is part of an ongoing effort by the Scottish Rite to make the exterior of its historic, 101 year-old building more inviting. General Secretary Curt Edic, 33°, noted that the beautiful painting may inspire wedding rentals, draw attention to the Scottish Rite, and ultimately help draw interest and membership.


new KCCH 'red hats' were honored at a banquet as General Secretaries from each Valley presented the new 32° KCCH recipients with their patents from the Supreme Council.



To an extent, we have. E-mails, FreemasonNetwork.org, SR Chirp, Facebook, Twitter, and social media give us numerous opportunities to communicate in

nearly real-time with one another. Never before in Freemasonry have so many brethren from around the nation been able to connect and exchange ideas!

But to a large extent, Freemasonry can't compete with the marketing world, both to our benefit and to our detriment. Television and radio advertising are a costly scatter gun approach, barely reaching the target audience. Freemasonry still lives in a world

of "hand to back" and "mouth to ear" communication, and the personal contact with members is tried and true.

We can't compete with wholesale mass media communication, the 24/7, alwayson, everywhere and anywhere marketing world. So let's go back to the old school way of promoting ourselves. I don't mean we let our letterhead do the talking. Instead, let's let Brotherhood itself do the talking. If we can't compete with today's 24/7 advertising, let's carry ourselves with the dignity and self-respect our Craft deserves. Let's be our own marketing campaign. When men see you walking down the street, they see a walking billboard of what Freemasonry is about.

Come to think of it, what could be a better representation of always-on, 24/7, interactive method of advertising Freemasonry than a Freemason whose very actions and carriage serve as better advertising than we could ever purchase!

Tiana's *Triumphant* Tale

Tune 2, 2010 at 10:41 am, Tiana Azra was born... our beautiful little girl. We sometimes refer to her as our little "surprise box". We call her that because she was full-term. I had a healthy pregnancy and there were no indications on the ultrasound that anything was amiss. Shortly after her birth, we learned that Tiana was born with a recessed chin that would complicate breathing and feeding, as well as a cleft palate. At seven days old, Tiana underwent jaw distraction surgery. She spent four weeks in the NICU be-

fore her homecoming. Our long-term outlook at that point was that she would have another surgery in three months to remove the screws from her jaw, surgery at approximately nine months to repair the cleft palate, and to expect possible orthodontic procedures and speech issues as she gets older. So that is what we knew was to come on our journey with Tiana.

Due to her congenital birth anomalies, Tiana started receiving Early Intervention Services – which was a team made up of a service coordinator, physical therapist, and occupational therapist. In November 2010, Tiana was sedated for her ABR (auditory brainstem response) hearing test.

It was at this appointment, we learned of Tiana's hearing loss. The evaluation revealed mixed hearing loss – moderate rising to mild. She was immediately fitted for hearing aids. A deaf educator joined the Early Intervention team at this point. Speech and language were a big focus, wanting to make sure Tiana received everything possible for language development. It was our Service Coordinator who told us about the Scottish Rite's RiteCare Augmentative Speech Preschool Program when Tiana was approximately 2 years old. I called right way and put her name on the waiting list.

Ten months later I received the phone call

that Tiana would be able to attend the Scottish Rite Speech group. I was thrilled as I heard so many good things about the program and it would give Tiana the opportunity to interact with other children.

She started speech group in August 2013 and graduated from the program in July 2015. Tiana also attended pre-school at Lied Learning and Technology Center for Childhood Deafness.

Tiana's two years in the Scottish Rite Speech Clin-

ic were enjoyable and very educational. It was one of Tiana's first visits to the clinic when I saw a familiar face...Paul Laikko. During her NICU stay, unbeknownst to us, we encountered Paul, one of the wonderful RiteCare therapists. He was introduced to us as a Feeding Specialist. He was instrumental in finding the right bottle for successful feedings. As our paths crossed again, three more compassionate speech therapists joined our journey: Korey Stading, Beth Hughes and Leslie Van Winkle. We met some wonderful families during this time too.

We were on a "communication/language" hunt with Tiana to find out what was the best mode of communication for her. Sixth months into the program, Tiana was diagnosed with Childhood Apraxia of Speech (CAS), a motor speech disorder. The child knows what she wants to say, but her brain has difficulty coordinating the muscle movements necessary to say those Another surprise and challenge for our little girl to overcome. She used many forms of communication and to this day, still does. Tiana vocalizes, signs, and uses a Dynavox (Assistive Augmentative Communication (AAC) device). the Dynavox, pictures were used to help her with expressive language. The amazing therapists that lead this speech group worked very hard to incorporate all of these

communication styles with Tiana. With the support of these fabulous ladies, the frustration of not being able to express herself seemed to diminish as she was getting better with making words and using her language "tools".

Her journey still continues and will no doubt be challenging, yet her determination, positive attitude and focus will keep ALL of us going. Tiana is a bright, sweet, fun loving, delightful girl with a song always in her heart. She just sparkles and lights up a room. She is now in Kindergarten and is having a successful year. Thank you Scottish Rite masons for making such a wonderful program for children possible. We are grateful for all of the speech therapists who worked with Tiana. You are all a part of Tiana's Triumphant Tale!



son's speech therapy, about 178 clinics now provide untold millions of dollars in services helping children overcome speech and language disorders at no cost to families.

Brother Tregg Lunn, 32° of the Lincoln Valley

told us last year that among all his beautiful daughter's surgeries and health needs, expressing herself through RiteCare therapy was the one service that did not come with an expensive price tag attached.

In 2016, the RiteCare budget for the state will be roughly \$640,000, encompassing salaries for 9 clinicians (7.2 FTEs for those in the Human Resources field) in Kearney, Hastings, Lincoln, and Omaha. They see more than 1,000 children throughout the year in over 5,500 sessions of therapy. Other than the public schools, RiteCare clinicians are the single largest provider of speech and language therapy for children, not just in Nebraska but in the United States!

That's quite a commitment of treasure!
