Masonry is a sinking ship.

Who wants to join an organization that leads a membership pitch with "Our membership is declining" and "Members are getting older?" As he writes, "It makes memoff lights when the organization disbands. Guys simply aren't going to become Masons if our sales pitch begins with, "Our membership is declining, but . . ." I'm no marketing expert, but that doesn't seem to be our strongest opening line.

As Rev. Bonney notes, membership numbers turn the focus on to something that is not part of our mission. We are in the business of creating Brotherhood for our members, not counting the number of dues cards on the rolls. Truly, quality is more important than quantity! Really, we need to be focusing on creating a memorable Masonic experience that keeps men engaged, coming back, and yes, hopefully bringing potential members with them.

The best way to grow membership is not

End of the Etha: After 20 year Career at Scottish Rite, Curt Edic, 33°, Retires as General Secretary

The Valley of Omaha celebrated the end of an era with the retirement of Curtis M. Edic, 33°, General Secretary after 16 years. Curt joined the Scottish Rite in 1975, intending to use the Scottish Rite as a springboard to get active in the Shrine. Along the way, he got involved in the Scottish Rite and has participated in one way or another ever since. He joined the staff as Assistant General Secretary to Jim Erixon, 33° in 1996, and then took over as General Secretary in 1999.

While his list of achievements is vast, perhaps the biggest legacies are left in a service-oriented leadership. The Line Officers are engaged in the leadership of the Valley, rather than a passive rubber-stamp to the Board. Curt has fostered an environment that welcomes the newest 32° Scottish Rite Mason, and helps him get involved. Curt fostered a strong unity among the Masonic bodies, and unity meetings work to avoid conflicting with one another's major events.

Curt also oversaw the renovation of the Scottish Rite, beginning in about 2000. Renovations included the first floor kitchen and dining room, second floor ball room, "middle chamber," lounge, and in 2014, the Grand Cross Room. On the third floor,

Curt oversaw the renovation of the theater as a first-class venue that has hosted the Youth Ballet, Opera Omaha, concerts, and weddings. In fact, rental revenue has blossomed to around \$100,000 each year, a significant source of the Valley's revenue.

His legacy includes involving the Scottish Rite in the downtown community. No longer the "secret clubhouse" of the Masons, the building has been used for Downtown Omaha, Inc. meetings, where Curt has served as Treasurer and Board member. Curt has represented the Scottish Rite at Downtown Rotary and the Chamber of Commerce. Many civic organizations view the Scottish Rite as a welcoming meeting place for their own events.

More than 250 Masons and friends joined Curt on January 9 for a relaxed evening to wish Curt good luck in retirement. Cathy Segrell, Marcia Rulla, and Greg Swinarski presented Curt with his office chair, signed by dozens of Scottish Rite Masons. The Lodge of Perfection presented Curt with a bronze eagle, and the Line Officers guild presented a carved wood Scottish Rite Eagle with the dates Curt served as General Secretary. M.W. John Maxell, succeeding Curt as General Secretary, presented Curt

to focus on head count, but focus on the mission. Nobody in the history of Masonry has ever joined because they want to read the bills, argue over the cost of paint or the phone bill, and have fried chicken and Masonic green beans in the Lodge basement afterward.

In fact, M.W. John Maxell, Grand Master, recently wrote about creating enthusiasm within the Lodge, holding a business meeting that is "a celebration and festival for Masonry." Masonry serves to fill a social, educational, and fraternal need for men. If our Lodges can fill that need, Brethren come back and are engaged!

Bonney notes that what is wrong with the membership discussion is that it supposes we would ever be content with just getting members. That's not why we joined Freemasonry. We took the oaths of Masonry "for a much higher and more holy goal to transform this world..."

The reality of Masonry is that we think of membership like that old American Express ad, "membership has its privileges," as if we were merely members of a club. But "membership" is much more complex. "Member," from the Latin word membrum, means "limb," or "part of the body." If you lost an arm or a leg, you have been quite literally "dismembered."

As members of a Lodge, this means far more than simply walking around with a dues card in your pocket. Yet, too many of our members are "dismembered" in this technical sense. They are separated from the Lodge, content with paying their dues and not really paying attention to the teachings of Masonry or striving to be better men in their interactions with others.

Being a Mason is much more than just "going to Lodge," since as Masons, we are the Lodge. (The building is merely the

physical structure where we keep top hats, aprons, and antique coffee makers.) If our Masonic membership is not merely an expression of numbers and is more than a matter of attendance, we should think of it as a connection to the community of Masons. As part of the body.

Being part of the body of Masons is what truly makes us Brothers. Having that connection is why we can visit another city and see someone wearing a Square and Compass and be able to call him Brother.

So when we talk about membership, don't think of it as a numbers game. Think of it as part of a broader question about how we share the mystic bond between ourselves and other men "travelling to the East" in a great community of Masons. And once we think of ourselves this way, the "numbers" question will resolve itself!

In 2016, Nebraska's Scottish Rite Masons will donate \$638,091 toward therapy, education, and programs at the RiteCare Speech and Language Clinics in Kearney, Hastings, Lincoln, and Omaha.

If you divide that by the 2,588 Scottish Rite Masons in Nebraska, that comes to a whopping \$247 per member for the year. (To put that in perspective, if the Omaha Valley held every event, activity, function, and expense with no other revenue source other than members' dues to pay for them, each member would pay \$790 to be a Scottish Rite Mason!) Now, if I told you I was going to send you an invoice for your share, you'd be rightfully indignant!

The Walk for RiteCare, Robert Burns Dinner, Century Club, 101-Club, the RiteCare Classic Golf Outing, and all the other events make a significant difference in meeting the cost for therapy and services for children affected by speech and language disorders.

That's why your support is so important each year: we continue to meet our obligation to the children without cutting services, while reducing our dependency on the endowment. Most
