I spent some time with Brethren and staff from House of the Temple, many of whom have been friends for years.

Fellowship, food and drink are plentiful and the lavish pageantry of the Scottish Rite Supreme Council is impressive. Washington, DC excels as a tourist-friendly city, and I found even the Secret Service or capitol police officers in front of the White House, US Treasury or US Capitol Building to offer that old southern hospitality and charm to everyone.

But in spite of several days of too much rich food and drink, the fellowship of lunches and dinners, and the impressively beautiful ceremony of the 33rd Degree conferral, I remember that this is the ultimate Masonic illusion.

None of it is real. What drove this point home was happening to see the Grand Commander of the Scottish Rite carrying his own bags out of his car into the hotel, looking as tired as he could be. Fifty Brethren would have leapt at the honor of carrying his suitcases for him, but he did it himself. That pointedly reminds me that Biennial Session is the ultimate illusion. When we go back home, we face the reality of our Lodges, our Scottish Rite bodies, membership issues, and the eponymous Lodge debate about \$27.43 spent on the phone bill or a bucket of paint.



Led by Amy Nordness, Ph.D., state director for the RiteCare Clinic, the clinicians met to share the success stories from each clinic, what has worked well, what processes can be improved, and their goals for the coming year.

Some of the milestones shared included the renovation of the original clinic space in the Hastings Masonic Center, a NICU follow-up grant, the involvement of graduate clinicians, a preschool group for Korean-speaking families, a lending library for families, and parent support programs. While Amy meets with the clinicians by a teleconference each quarter, a faceto-face meeting facilitated clinicians' collaboration and ideas on how these programs can be improved or shared among the clinics.

Afterward, the RiteCare Clinicians met to discuss operational and management issues, including the national RiteCare Conference to be hosted in Omaha on September 9-11, 2022.

The Scottish Rite Masons benefit by meeting the program providers whose therapy we support. The Clinicians have always expressed their profound gratitude that the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska frees them from having to track deductibles or therapy sessions covered by insurance.

The next RiteCare Retreat will be held at the Lincoln Scottish Rite on September 25, 2020.

Eleven members of the Orient of Ne-braska Scottish Rite and seven wives went to Washington, D.C. for the 2019 Biennial Session of the Scottish Rite and Coronation of the new 33° Inspectors General Honorary.

After a few days of visiting the sites of the nation's capitol, Scottish Rite Masons attended the opening ceremony of the Biennial Session. This was an auspicious session, as Lt. Grand Commander James Cole, 33°, SGIG for Virginia, was installed as the new Grand Commander for the Scottish Rite. As newly elected Chancellor for the Scottish Rite, Charles V. Sederstrom, Jr., 33° will advise Scottish Rite bodies on what may or may not be permissible based on interpretation of the Supreme Council By-Laws.

As new Grand Commander, Jim Cole, 33° cautioned Scottish Rite Masons, particularly the newly coroneted 33° members against thinking that since they have achieved this new honor, they can kick back and say they're done. Brother Cole reminded us what we often say in Nebraska - this honor is not for what you've done, but for what you will do. In that respect, the theme for the Biennial Session was "Passing On the Tools of Leadership," and we were reminded that not only do we as Brethren continue to labor in the quarries of Masonry, and we are responsible for imparting the tools of the Craft, the leadership, and the wisdom to the next generation of members.

UNMC Munroe-Meyer Institute Breaks Ground on New \$86 Million Dollar Campus

The University of Nebraska Medical Center hosted a groundbreaking for renovations to the Munroe-Meyer Institute for Genetics and Rehabilitation (MMI) on Monday, August 26, 2019. Chancellor Jeffrey Gold served as emcee for the ceremonies and welcomed Lt. Governor Michael Foley, Omaha Mayor Jean Stothert, MMI Director Karoly Mirnics, and MMI advocates Denise Gehringer and her son Jacob.

Because the project at 69th and Pine Streets does not involve breaking ground on an all-new building, donors instead joined medical center officials and others in pounding ceremonial nails for the occasion.

The \$86 million dollar project will double the current size of the institute's size to 220,078 square feet. Nebraska's Scottish Rite Masons have made a 5-year \$100,000 pledge toward the project as part of our commitment to MMI.

In addition to improving clinical space for our RiteCare Clinics' speech therapy, the newly renovated space will offer several new amenities:

- An accessible, family-centric floor plan, designed to simplify the patient's clinical experience;
- A redesigned and integrated Center for Autism Spectrum Disorders (iCASD), under the leadership of a

- newly recruited, nationally recognized expert in autism, where MMI professionals will provide interdisciplinary care;
- A one-bedroom "apartment," where occupational therapists can help individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities learn and practice hands-on life skills;
- The Caring For Champions Program, a collaboration with Special Olympics that will enhance the experience for youngsters who attend Camp Munroe.

UNMC says the renovation will be finished in the Fall of 2020.

After the gold chains come off and the regalia and tuxedoes get hung in the closet, the illusion is over and we get back to work.

As Ill. Ronald A. Seale, 33° prepared to retire from his role as Grand Commander of the Scottish Rite for the past 15 years, he reminded us that "Masonry is not something we can do ourselves - to progress from musty ritual and old traditions... we must see our fellow member as someone of equal worth and value."

The importance of these words reflects the perfect marriage between the illusion of Biennial Session and the reality of Brethren working together on the level back in our home Lodges and Valleys. Our new Grand Commander said that now that we have these titles and honors, we can't simply kick up our feet and say that the work is done.

Because we have these titles and honors, someone will be looking at us as the example of what a Masonry should be. That doesn't set us apart from the Brethren. Rather, it give us the additional responsibility of being part of the Brethren.

As Scottish Rite Masons, particularly Honors Brethren, we must engage with all the members to address the issues that face our Craft today.

Ron Seale and Jim Cole instinctively knew that Masonry is more than "musty ritual and old traditions." As Ronald Seale said when he visited Omaha in 2011, Masonry happens when the guys in the kitchen making lunch and sharing jokes or working in the wardrobe room between degrees. If you look at those guys, you'll find they are pretty heavy with titles, honors, and past offices, earned through their labors and their time.

Biennial Session is over. The dinners were excellent and the speeches were beautiful, but it was all for show. The real work begins now back at the Lodge. The new year and new leaders will bring unknown changes, but we will see a leadership that accepts the challenges and is ready to work with the members, listen to us, and create a strong future. I hope you'll be part of this reality!

Giving the Gift of

A Brother recently called me to tell me he had November 2 marked on his calendar. That's the day he turns 70 1/2. More importantly, that is when he becomes eligible to contribute



For eligible Brethren, please consider a year-end distribution from your IRA

part of his Individual Retirement Account (IRA) to his Valley's Scottish Rite Foundation.

Not only does a donation from his IRA make a significant impact on the ability to serve our RiteCare children, but he can take advantage of the so-called IRA charitable rollover. If not for the charitable rollover, he would have to start taking yearly required minimum distributions.

IRA account owners must take distributions at age 70 1/2 and pay tax on the withdrawals. With the charitable IRA rollover, the donation - up to \$100,000 - can count towards the minimum required distribution you would otherwise be required to make.

This has a few advantages. Donations to charitable organizations like the Scottish Rite Foundations do not

require paying income tax on withdrawals from IRA accounts. While there is no income tax deduction for a donor's contributions, the sum going to charity is not included in his adjusted gross income. Plus,

donating these assets, rather than taking minimum required distributions, may also enable older donors to avoid certain penalties that come with a higher AGI, such as higher Medicare premiums.

To make a charitable distribution from your IRA, simply direct your IRA plan administrator to make a donation directly from your account to the charitable organizations of your choice. Increasingly, Scottish Rite Masons are using this option to support our RiteCare Clinics and their favorite Masonic philanthropies.

As always, please think about ways to support RiteCare. Talk to your attorney or financial advisor about how these options directly impact your own situation.
