


By age sixteen, young George Washington had copied out by hand, 110 Rules of Civility & Decent Behavior in Company and Conversation, presumably as an exercise in penmanship assigned by a schoolmaster. The Rules are based on a set of rules composed by French Jesuits in 1595. For example,

Spit not in the Fire, nor Stoop low before it neither Put your Hands into the Flames to warm them. . .

By today's standards, many of these rules sound out of date. In fact, they represent a discipline of character that is as valued in 2020 as they were in Washington's youth. We may not spit into the fire, but perhaps today's rule might be *Don't bury yourself in your cell phone in the company of others*. More than just good manners, Washington's rules represent

the sacrifices a man makes of his own immediate comfort or self-interest for the sake of those around him and the community in which he lives. His rules demonstrate respect for others, and in return, his rules gave him the gift of self-respect and self-esteem.

In his book on Washington, Richard

Brookhiser wrote that "all modern manners in the western world were originally aristocratic. *Courtesy* meant behavior appropriate to a court; *chivalry* comes from chevalier – a knight.

Yet George Washington would dedicate himself to freeing America from a court's control. Could manners survive the operation? Without realizing it, the Jesuits who wrote them, and the young man who copied them, were outlining and absorbing a system of courtesy appropriate to equals and near-equals. When the company for whom the decent behavior was to be performed expanded to the nation, Washington was ready. Parson Weems got this right, when he wrote that it was 'no wonder every body honoured him who honoured every body."

The Hastings RiteCare Clinic recently received a Tobii Dynavox Indi with Snap + Core First Speech Generating Device (SGD). This device contains a specialized communication system called Snap + Core First which allows children who are nonverbal, have unintelligible (hard to understand) speech, Autism Spectrum Disorder, Childhood Apraxia of Speech, and other developmental delays to communicate with those around them. Each child who utilizes this speech generated device will select meaningful picture symbols in order to convey their message (e.g. "I am hungry.").

Hastings RiteCare will use this device for a variety of purposes: to evaluate and



Words can not express how truly thankful we are for Caden to have been given the opportunity to correct his speech issues in such a wonderful environment. Within Freemasonry, the Rules of Civility include the ancient charges that "it is now thought more expedient only to oblige [Masons] to that Religion in which all Men agree, leaving their particular Opinions to themselves; that is to be good Men and true, or Men of Honour and Honesty, by whatever Denominations or Persuasions they may be distinguish'd; whereby Masonry becomes the Center of Union, and the Means of conciliating true Friendship among Persons that must have remain'd at a perpetual Distance." (Anderson's Constitutions of 1723)

So in other words, leave your religion and politics at the door. This dictum holds true today in Masonry.

As men of our communities, we have our passions, our disagreements - increasingly less pleasant in this politically-charged age - but for the sake of our Masonic community and the well-being of the entire Craft, we individually (try to) set aside those things which separates us and what divides us.



Like George Washington's rules, we do this to illustrate our respect for others who may believe differently. In return for our forbearance, we gain the respect of others, who might otherwise "have remain'd at a perpetual distance."

Most recently, an e-mail from the Grand Master of Massachusetts, oldest Grand Lodge in the United States, invited Masons to practice the virtue of civility. An invitation. Not an edict. Masons are not *required* to be politically neutral or to give up their free speech. Masons were simply asked to honor our history and be a worldly exemplification of the virtues our Craft holds so dear.

It seems that the rules of civility are in as much need now as they have ever been. The factions that divide us are everywhere - social media, the news outlets we watch, the sports team we celebrate. It only takes a click of a mouse to lambaste those with whom we disagree as the enemy!

Yet Freemasonry, by its very nature, unites men of all backgrounds. Practicing civility in the Lodge and communities is as important as ever.

George Washington made the practice of civility his habit, and by doing so, united an entire nation. The least we can do is follow his noble example.

Giving the Gift of

Preserving Your Legacy

The Scottish Rite Foundation received a significant gift when a Brother who passed away last year when he named the Scottish Rite Foundation as the beneficiary in a Charitable Remainder Trust.

A Charitable Remainder Trust is a taxexempt irrevocable trust designed to reduce the taxable income of individuals by first dispersing income to the beneficiaries of the trust for a specified period of time, and then donating trhe remainder of the trust to a designated charity or charities. In this case, his wife can spend the money in the trust as she sees fit for the remainder of her life. Whatever remains after she passes away goes to the Scottish Rite Foundation and other non-profit organizations.

As our membership ages, Charitable Remainder Trusts have become increasingly popular as a way to both take care of loved ones while leaving a member's legacy for Masonic philanthropies. Another Brother set his trust to pay the Scottish Rite 1/8th of the remainder of his trust in October, 2029.

In short, the charitable remainder trust allows you to make a significant gift through your estate while retaining an income for you or your loved ones for life or for a term of years. In addition,



you can receive immediate charitable income tax benefits when you establish a charitable remainder trust.

A second gift that we have seen increasingly used is the Individual Retirement Account (IRA) distribution. For those 70 1/2 years or older, you can simply direct your IRA administrator to make a donation to the Scottish Rite Foundation in your Valley or the philanthropies of your choice. The advantage is that you are using pre-tax dollars to make a tax-deductible gift, rather than using after tax dollars. (You have to earn \$118 to make a \$100 donation if you pay taxes of 15%, versus an IRA distribution of \$100 on money you didn't pay any taxes on.)
