ing competitions for ornate silver trophies. Shriners' parades stretched for blocks and blocks as units marched past the reviewing stands in elaborately embroidered costumes. Scottish Rite consistories in even the smallest Valleys did all 29 Degrees with well-practiced teams in full costume, from memory over the course of several days and nights. No crib notes tucked up the sleeve, no blue jeans poking out from underneath a robe!

The Hastings Scottish Rite was part of a record Give Hastings Day last May, raising \$676,556 for non-profits serving Adams County. The Valley raised \$5,368 from RiteCare families and members, including over \$2,100 from a special campaign by RiteCare mom Jacqueline Cranson, who owns Small Town Famous on W. 2nd Street in Hastings. Tagge Rutherford Property & Casualty also promoted Rite-Care, donating back to the Clinic. In addition, RiteCare also received a \$500 award for the biggest increase in donors since 2020 plus \$283 in 'bonus bucks,' for a total of \$6,151, all of which supports speech therapy through the Hastings Scottish Rite Foundation!

She had no idea what was coming when she walked into the Belmont Elementary School Gym. She thought it was an assembly to showcase her fifth graders' work.

The Scottish Rite Award is a distinguished award within Nebraska, specifically Lincoln Public Schools. The award has been given out to an outstanding teacher since 1965, with Bobbie Ehrlich being the 56th teacher to receive the award.

Teachers are typically nominated by their administrators or others who work closely with them. Ehrlich was chosen for her dedication to preparing her fifth graders and their families to become ready for the future. She said she was shocked and honored by the award.

"I got to share this with the most important people in my life, my family and





my Belmont family," said Ehrlich. "I'm very appreciative of the opportunity every day to do what I believe I was put on this Earth to do."

Ehrlich has spent all 32 years of her teaching career at Belmont. She said she has taught three generations of Belmont students.

Given out since 1965, the Distinguished Teacher of the Year Award comes with a \$10,000 check, endowed by Lincoln Scottish Rite Masons, which the teacher may use any way she wishes.

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Assessing Omaha's Scenic Backdrops

Tf space permitted, we could write **■** pages about the Scottish Rite's scenic drops. In June, Wendy Waszut-Barrett, Ph.D. visited from Minneapolis for a few days, to assess, appraise, and consult on Omaha's Scottish Rite scenic backdrops in the theater. Wendy declared Omaha's to be some of the finest preserved drops she has visited, and she should know! Her expertise is in the history and restoration of scenic drops, particularly of those made for the Scottish Rite fraternity.

Our original drops were made by Sosman & Landis in 1914, and our current drops were purchased in 1996 for approximately \$40,000 from the Valley of Kansas City, Kansas. They were painted in 1951-1953 by Maj. Don Carlos DuBois of the Great Western Stage Equipment Company of Kansas City, Missouri. DuBois was known to include his name on the drops, despite written admonition from his superiors not to. DuBois' name appears on the plates in the vault scene of the 15th

Our Speech Language Pathologist, Holly Schlautman, has recently introduced a new additional approach to help our son grow with confidence regarding his difference in speech amongst his peers.

The idea was brought about to begin a "Bumpy Speech Bootcamp". The name "Bumpy Speech Bootcamp" elaborates on working Miss Holly dressed for 'Super Hero

through those times when a stutter develops causing frustration with difficulty being able to use appropriate sounds of words in ev-

eryday speech.

This rings true for Braysen in times when he is very excited or tired and speech sounds become "bumpy" or stuttered. This in addition to difficulty with

lead to one frustrated and or discouraged 5 year old at times. The con-

cept behind the group sessions is to teach him that it is okay to be "different" with his speech, learn ways to remain confident in his

communication, and learn strategies to improve his fluency.

The "Bumpy Speech Bootcamp" meets once a month for an hour. There are currently 3 children working in this group together with similar speech focus. Some of the exercises performed in class have shown them that it is okay to make mistakes. Through fun games and activities, acceptance and growth are learned.

AZARI'S STORY

Tt was right at the time that COVID had shut down our world that I realized my son was not hitting many developmental milestones he should be hitting at 18 months. He was born prematurely, so for the first 12-16 months it was the go-to reasoning behind his slowing development. Not only was this realization

a roller coaster of emotions for me as a parent, I also felt alone and helpless as many organizations and services were shut down due to the pandemic.

Six months after this realization, my son was finally able to be evaluated virtually and given a diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). As a parent, my concerns were growing concerning the amount of time we had lost getting professional help due to the pandemic. After what seemed like a million different services, wait lists, programs, and names were given to me, I felt overwhelmed and lost.

Fortunately for us, our first real contact with services was being referred to Project ImPACT and in touch with the amazing Beth Hughes at the UNMC Munroe-Meyer Institute. [Project Im-PACT is a program that uses naturalistic developmental behavioral intervention strategies to help caregivers improve their child's social engagement, communication, imitation and play skills.]

Beth immediately made me feel optimistic, calm and ready to learn how to help my son. While the first half of the program was not ideal (due to having virtual meetings during the pandemic) she provided me with a plethora of information to help start engaging in play with my son. Finally, we were getting somewhere!



As a parent you have this constant worry that you're failing your child when you are trying to engage with them and teach them valuable skills, yet things aren't clicking. I can't stress enough how much Beth's positive attitude and empathy helped me as a Mother. Her teaching style made it easier for me to understand what I needed to do to help

start the process of play engagement and communication with Azari, which in turn also lessened his frustrations with me. Halfway through Project ImPACT

we were finally able to safely meet in person, and at that point his development took off! I was quite astounded by the progress we started to make.

It is bittersweet to finish Project Im-PACT, as I'm so very grateful for this strong foundation Beth helped us build, and we will miss her dearly. She has gone above and beyond to answer questions and suggest other services we could use going forward. Beth is a gem, as a professional and as a person who is obviously passionate about helping give a voice to those who don't quite have one yet.

So we say thank you so very much to Miss Beth and to all of you who help make Project ImPACT possible. We are forever grateful.

The new building, which effectively doubles the space to 220,000 square feet for therapy services, replaces an older patchwork of buildings on the UNMC campus, some of which date back to the 1950s.

The Munroe–Meyer Institute (MMI) has been a part of the Omaha community since 1920, serving the needs of peo-

\$100,000 toward the \$92 million dollar cost of the new building, which was largely underwritten by several major Foundations in Nebraska, including the Lozier, Weitz, and Scott Foundations.

In addition to the \$100,000 pledge, the Nebraska Scottish Rite maintains an annual commitment of \$750,000 for speech therapy services for children through the RiteCare Clinic. The Nebraska Scottish Rite has also endowed a professorship in Speech-Language Pathology, currently held by Amy Nordness, Ph.D., Director of the RiteCare Clinic.

In addition to the RiteCare Clinic, the new MMI building includes cold and warm-water pools, an indoor splash pad, state-of-the-art physical therapy and virtual reality labs. Simulated apartment spaces will help young people with intellectual and developmental disabilities learn to live independently.

Dr. Karoly Mirnics, Director of the Munroe-Meyer Institute, declared that these services are not here for a day, but for a lifetime. "...[this] represents a promise to help them reach their potential," he said at the dedication.

Susan Gass said her 15-year-old son, Kaleb, who has Down Syndrome, initially visited the institute for speech therapy. For the past nine years, he has come for recreational therapy. The institute offers camps throughout the year. There, he can let down his guard and simply be with his friends. "It is his community, and he fits," Susan said.

Dan Wellendorf, 33°, Deputy to the Supreme Council, said, "We are indebted to Charles V. Sederstrom, Jr., 33° as SGIG and Dr. Nordness who built a cohesive unit among our RiteCare Clinics across the state, improving and expanding services for children. Now, we will work for a long-term endowment to make sure those services are available for Munroe-Meyer's second century."
