## Lincoln Valley Hosts Tailgate at the 'Rite Membership Evening



#### The Value of RiteCare

My husband Wade (32°) was going through some past issues of the *Scottish Rite Journal*, and came across this one from 2012. My son Ben happened to be in one of the articles celebrating him graduating from services he received from the RiteCare Clinic.

Ben was diagnosed with Apraxia of Speech (a motor speech disorder where messages from the brain fail to communicate with muscles in the mouth, making it hard to speak) when he was a little over 2 years old. He did not speak for those 2 1/2 years, and only grunted when he wanted something or "grunt talked." My mom read an article about the RiteCare Clinic and their services (both Wade and my dad are Scottish Rite Masons). We were concerned for Ben and did not know where to begin getting him help. I was scared, worried and afraid.

I was afraid to just make a simple phone call that I knew deep down would change our lives for the better. But mostly I was scared they were going to tell me that there's no hope for Ben. I took a deep breathe, put all those worries aside and I called.

When I called, I was directed to whom I needed to get in touch with and a few phone calls and a few questions answered, we set up a time for Ben to be evaluated. I was so excited, my buddy Ben was gonna get help he needed!

Dan Wellendorf, 33°, Deputy to the Supreme Council, welcomed guests. He spoke about the continued need to collaborate with the Clinicians and serve as stewards for the long-term success of RiteCare's mission of providing speech and language therapy to Nebraska children.

achieving a standard of excellence as defined by the character of the Lodge.

The Candidate-turned-Brother earns his own respect and honor through his dedication of learning the ritual, and his Brethren earn the respect by serving as mentors. All Brethren develop respect and the traits of manhood through the quality of their words, actions, and behavior.

When the Brethren fail to take the time and effort to earn that respect, the cogs of Masonry break down. At best, the Lodge simply goes through the motions of opening, closing, doing Degree work. Wash, rinse, and repeat.

So how do we build that respect between Brethren and develop those characteristics and values of thoughtful Manhood? Rather than recite a



litany of axioms from leadership manuals, there is one that, to me, encompasses the entirety of how we achieve respect across membership and leadership in Freemasonry: *rethink everything*.

Rethinking everything begins with the initial contact with the Candidate, to the Degree work, to the way we conduct Lodge business. or events. If Masons are doing these things:

creating meaningful communication among members,

- wholeheartedly fulfilling our obligations as officers,
- owning up to any failures or shortcomings,
- engaging Brethren directly,
- showing a confidence and a purpose in Masonry to inspire others,
- working toward proficient Degree work or opening/closing ritual.

These are the characteristics of a Manhood-based model that builds a foundation for strong and empowered leaders and creates a system of mutual respect among Brethren.

By rethinking the entirety of the Masonic experience, we are creating a new generation of Masons with the bearing and gravitas to truly build the fraternity for the coming century.

#### To do this,

- you must be 70 1/2 to make a taxfree distribution from your IRA,
- you can make up to \$100,000 to an eligible non-profit organization without paying income tax on the transaction,
- if you file jointly, your spouse can make a charitable contribution of up to \$100,000 as well, meaning couples can exclude up to \$200,000 of retirement savings from income tax if they donate to charity,
- charitable donations must be made from an IRA rather than a 401(k), so you might need to roll funds from a 401(k) to an IRA to make a distribution.
- and you don't need to itemize your taxes in order to make an IRA charitable distribution.

Please talk this over with your family, your financial planner or attorney about how a donation can affect your tax situation, as well as how a charitable contribution from your IRA can cement your legacy to the Scottish Rite.

Another powerful tool that can make a substantial impact on our Scottish Rite philanthropies is by purchasing an insurance policy, naming the Scottish Rite as a beneficiary.
