Membership

During a search on membership statistics for organizations, an interesting trend emerged: the growth of young professional organizations. Across all organizations, there was an explosion of groups for 20 and 30-somethings. In fact, the city Chamber of Commerce has a program geared entirely toward helping companies create groups for young professionals. There has been an equally large surge in young members joining unions or trade organizations.

A closer look, however, reveals that affinity groups account for the overwhelming majority of this growth. This might be an emerging professionals organization within an occupation like Young Bankers or Young Lawyers, but also affinity guilds for patrons in their 20s or 30s for organizations like the Friends of the Library, Opera, Symphony, or Art Museum.

Each of these young professional (YP) organizations share a well-defined purpose and vision, clearly mapped goals for their members tied to the groups' broader objectives, and an impact the members can make in the community. The members can enjoy social and networking opportunities, leadership development, civic engagement and involvement, and a philanthropic cause - all while benefiting the parent organization.

By the very diverse nature of Freemasonry, with multiple Lodges and

Elizabeth's Progress



Thanks to Nebraska's Scottish Rite Masons

In December of 2016, at two months Lold, our daughter, Elizabeth Hope, was diagnosed with a very rare genetic condition called Trisomy 9 Mosaic Syndrome (T9M). We were armed with two very small studies on 60 individuals with T9M and a Facebook group with under two hundred families with the same diagnosis. We literally had no idea what to expect, but it was fairly evident that many individuals with T9M were non-verbal or had limited language. There is a very high level of anxiety when you realize there is a strong chance that your child may never be able to meet typical milestones, especially speech. We started asking everyone for advice, to make sure we were doing everything that we could to set Elizabeth up for success given the challenges that lay ahead.

A friend of mine suggested that we call the RiteCare program at the UNMC Munroe-Meyer Institute (MMI). I was determined to do everything in my power to help her have the best possible quality of life, so I made the call!

By the time Elizabeth was old enough to enroll in the program, she was still non-verbal. Her delays and low muscle tone were also impacting her ability to sign. Elizabeth began attending MMI just before she began attending preschool. We loved the RiteCare program so much that we actually arranged Elizabeth's school schedule around her MMI schedule! Watching Elizabeth engage with the teachers each week was an incredible experience, for both her and for us! We picked up on some of the tactics

they used in class and soon we had some basic signs at home. Shortly after beginning, our Clinician Beth Hughes introduced a communication device to Elizabeth and to our excitement, Elizabeth started picking up on it!

When COVID hit, there were so many things up in the air, but Beth's commit-



-ment to helping Elizabeth's speech progression wasn't one of them! Each week we met and each week Elizabeth started picking up on a little more, sometimes it was sounds, sometimes signs, and sometimes she would use her device more.

Elizabeth was gaining the ability to communicate. I was floored that we were able to continue one-to-one sessions during the entirety of the pandemic! The ability to meet virtually also meant that Elizabeth's nurses and therapists were also exposed to utilizing a speech device, as well as the skills to engage and encourage Elizabeth. Beth gave us an incredible amount of confidence, knowledge, and skills for pushing Elizabeth to learn and grow, as well as how to advocate for Elizabeth during her individual education plans.

Elizabeth keeps adding to her sign language vocabulary and is close to having thirty signs she uses. It is rewarding to see her identify colors or animals, and independently make declarations about wanting to play outside, or telling her older sister she wants to cuddle. In addition, she's continuously growing in her capacity to use her communication device.

We've been given the gift of being able to help Elizabeth find her "voice," as she learns and communicates. Without these services and guidance, we never would have been able to steer her this far. Because of what we have learned through the RiteCare program, her education experience is that much richer and her speech therapy is progressing at an increasingly positive rate!

I can not tell you the number of times I've heard compliments from teachers and therapists about how Elizabeth was already learning how to use a speech device at 4 years old. Each time I hear that it both breaks my heart and makes me so incredibly thankful for the RiteCare program. I wish that every non-verbal child could have as strong of an advocate as Beth is for Elizabeth.

We never, ever could have imagined just how impactful the Scottish Rite program would be for Elizabeth and our family, but we are so truly grateful! There is so much joy in finding ways to communicate with your child, and to provide them the skills and abilities to communicate with the world around them. This experience has been a most valuable gift to our family, and has been beautiful to witness! Please pass our extreme gratitude along to the wonderful supporters who had the forethought to provide such a wonderful program for children, like Elizabeth, in our community!

appendant bodies, each with their own leadership structure, hierarchy, different philanthropies or missions, creating a new young professional Masons organization would be impossible to organize and maintain.

But the lessons of how to engage young professionals most certainly apply to Freemasonry. Young professionals demand something more concrete than nebulous Masonic slogans like "brotherly love," "relief," and "truth."

They want a concrete value statement to define the purpose and direction of Freemasonry. They want measurable short and long-term goals to provide a sense of whether they are achieving those objectives. They want to see definitive deliverables offered by their membership: networking, community engagement or volunteering, education, social outlets for families.

The beauty is that Masons already have this framework in place: our By-Laws provide specific structure, responsibilities for officers, committees, and outline how a meeting will be run. The leadership structure - Master, Wardens, Deacons, and Stewards - is already well-developed.

What remains to be done is to create programming based on what members, particularly younger members, actually want. The existing structure already offers an outlet for the social opportunities, civic engagement, and charitable causes. It simply needs to be focused on what members actually want, rather than the eponymous spaghetti feed. For example, Mizpah Lodge #302 members created a book club, currently discussing Brené Brown's book *Dare to Lead*.

The young professional members want to know that their membership has achieved something or offers something that gives a value for their input of time, talent, and leadership. They want to know that the organization had some impact in the community beyond "greet, meet, and repeat."

There is a definite thirst among young men in society to be part of an organization, and Masonry offers the framework to give it to them!

Each scholarship will be for \$1,000.00, awarded annually. Applications will be available on the scottishrite.org website under the Philanthropies → Scholarships tab.

So far, a total of 15 scholarships have been created, with 7 of the scholarships being fully endowed. Endowed scholarships require a minimum donation of \$50,000. An annual scholarship can be created for a donation of \$1,000.00.

Brethren wishing to make an additional contribution to either scholarship may contribute to them directly through the Scottish Rite Foundation, Supreme Council, Southern Jurisdiction or contribute to their Orient or Valley Scottish Rite Foundation earmarked towards their local scholarship program.
